Enterprise Rent-A-Car: For our company, a suit most definitely. They need to be conservative and well dressed in a business suit — black, blue, red.

Raising Cane’s: **First Employer:** For my interview, I’m not necessarily looking for great dressed crew members. Part of our culture is that we have laid-back uniforms. I’m just mainly looking to see are they clean cut? Do they look me in the eye? So I mean our uniforms are laid back anyway — shorts, t-shirt, hats — so I’m not really looking for well dressed.

Microsoft Corp: Microsoft’s really relaxed. So, I mean, granted we may not want you to wear something that you know is offensive along the terms of a T-shirt, but it’s pretty relaxed. You could wear slacks and a comfortable shirt. We’re just looking for people to be comfortable. That’s how we dress at the company. I’m actually more dressed up than most people.
